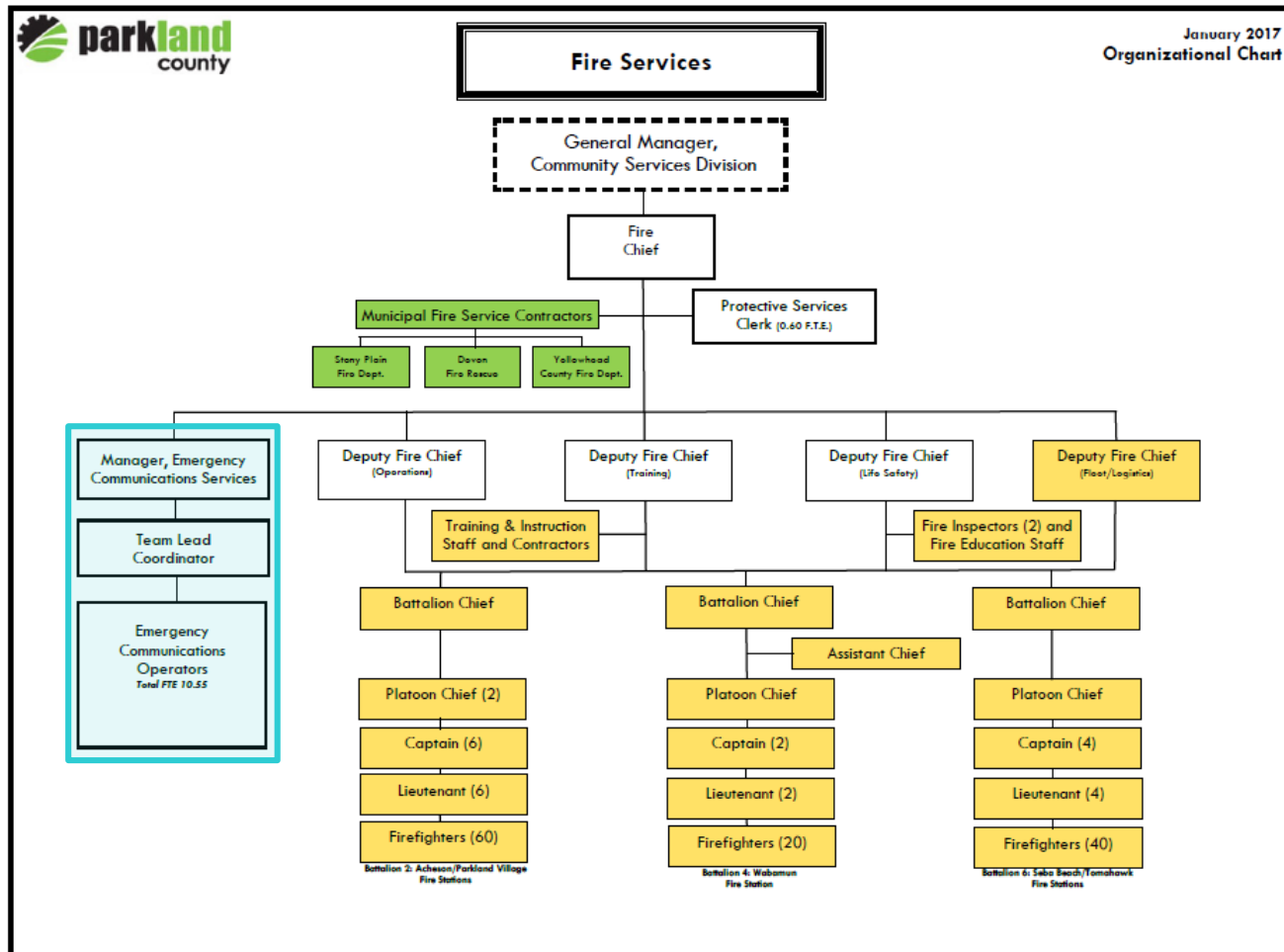

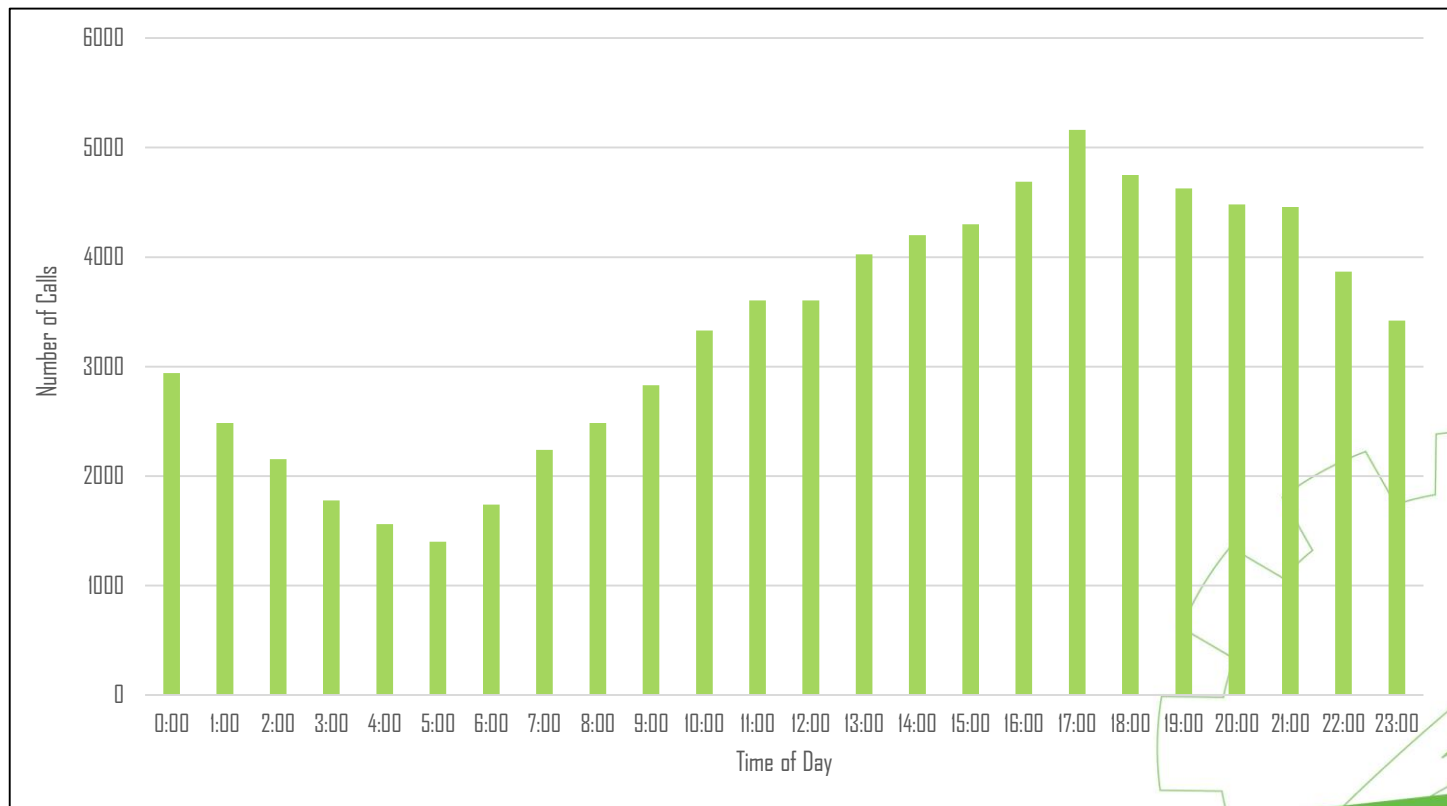
ECC Core Services

- Provide (24/7) 9-1-1 call answer to over 127 municipalities, serving a population of 235,396
- Provide emergency fire dispatch to 47 fire departments
- Provide community peace officer dispatch to 9 community peace officer departments
- Provide a communication link with the RCMP, STARS, EMS and Disaster Services
- Provide alarm monitoring for County facilities and work alone monitoring by way of contractual fee for service agreements.

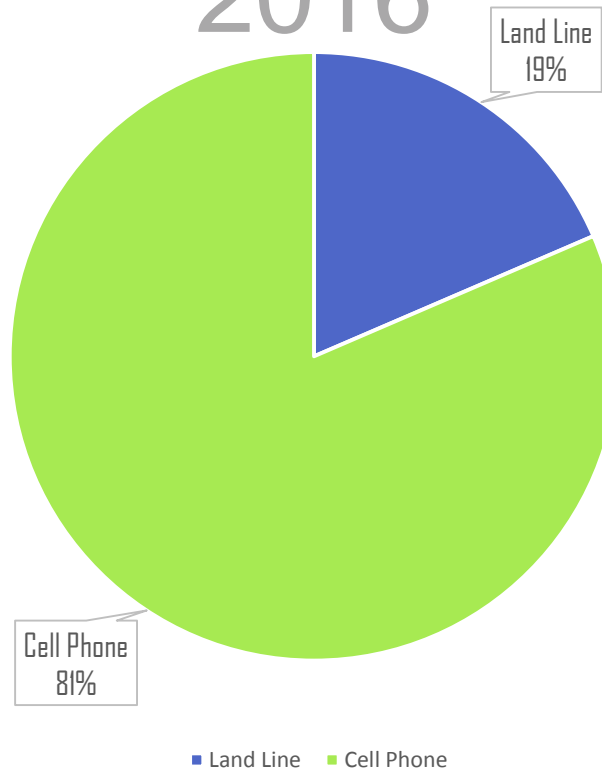

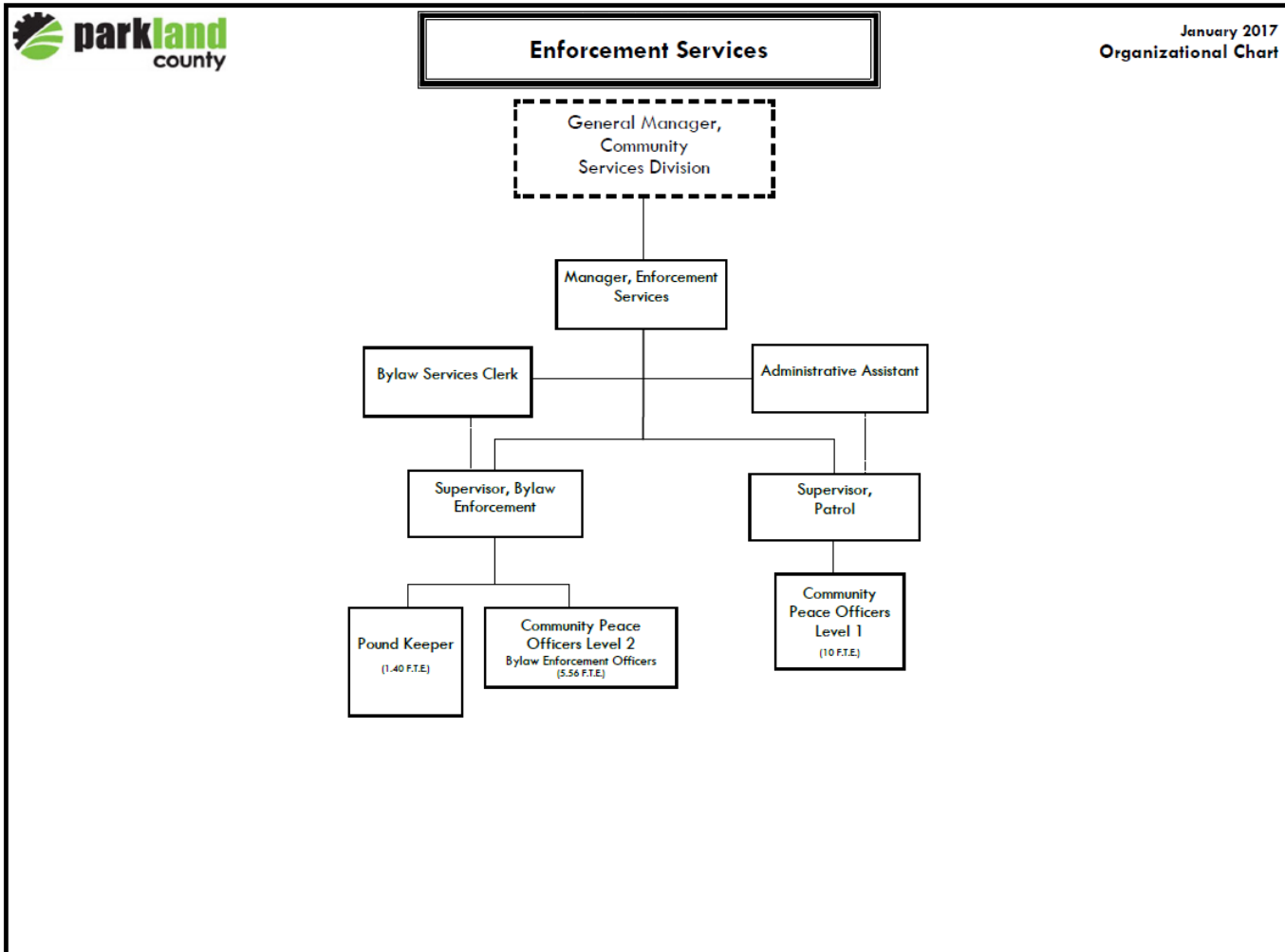
ECC Initiatives

- Enforcement Services is Staffed with 16 full time Community Peace Officers, we patrol all County roads and residential areas
- We liaise with numerous outside agencies to engage in joint operations and ensure that our department is aware of current trends and social issues.
- The Parkland County Animal Shelter is staffed by two Enforcement Services Assistants and two Poundkeepers:
- We are committed to the youth in our community, and offers many educational programs in Parkland County schools.

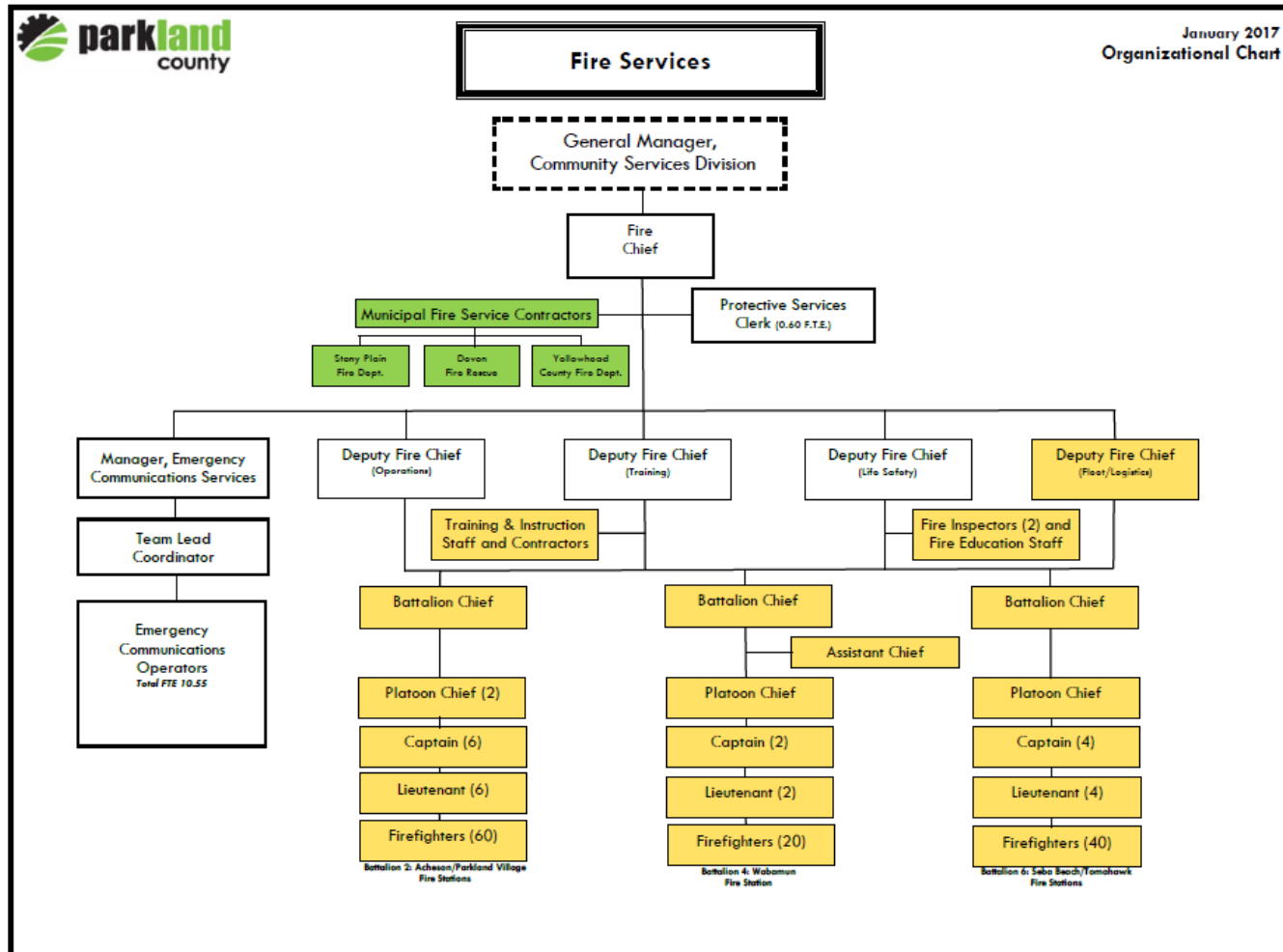

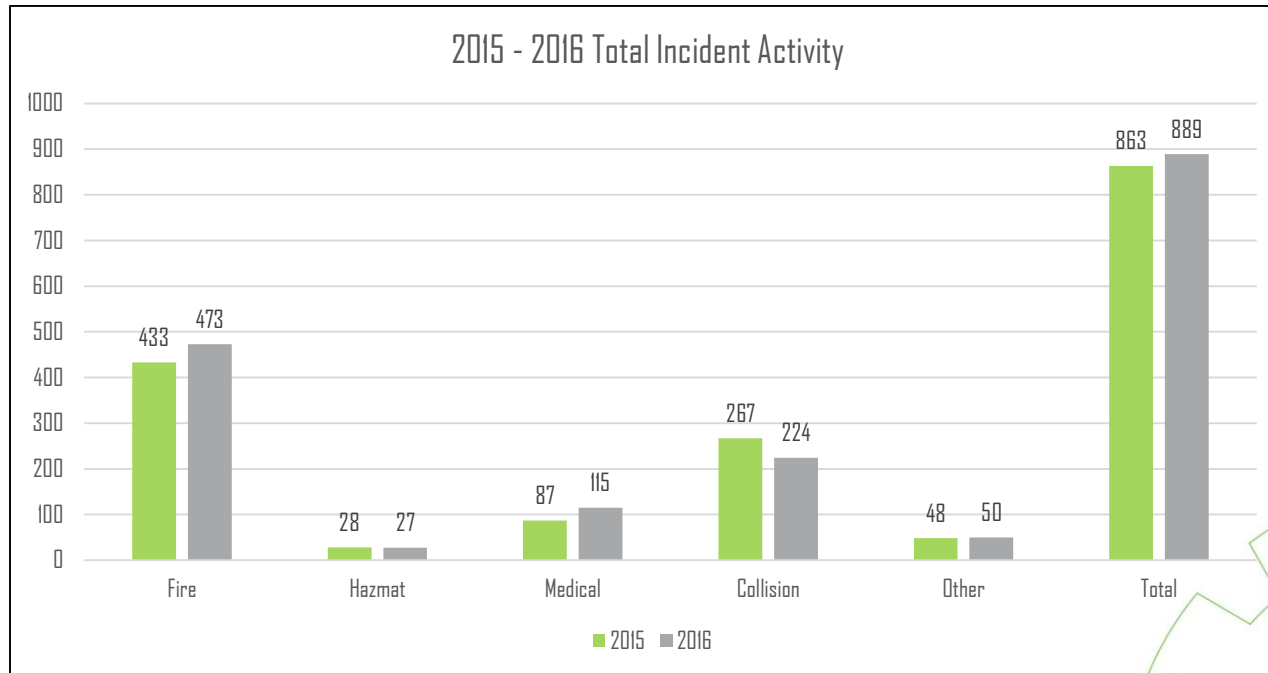

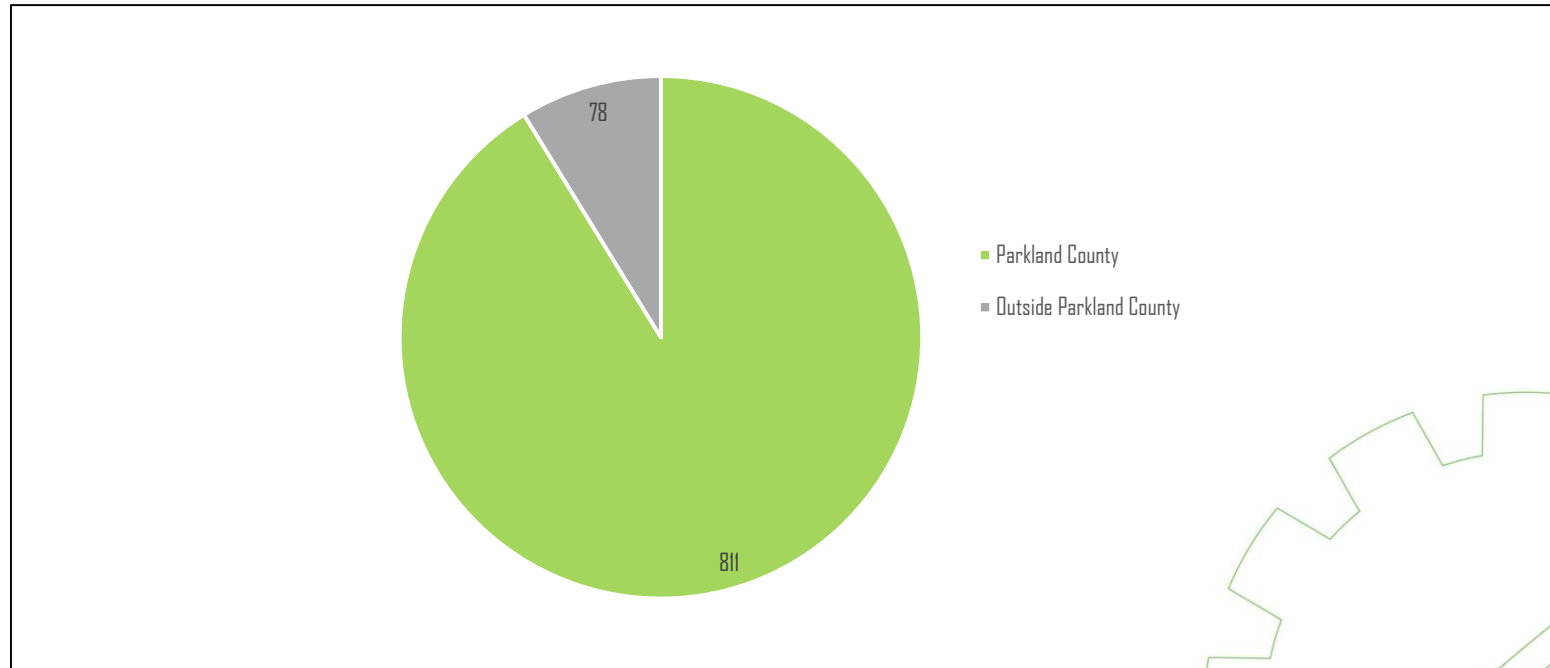


Fire Services Incident Data

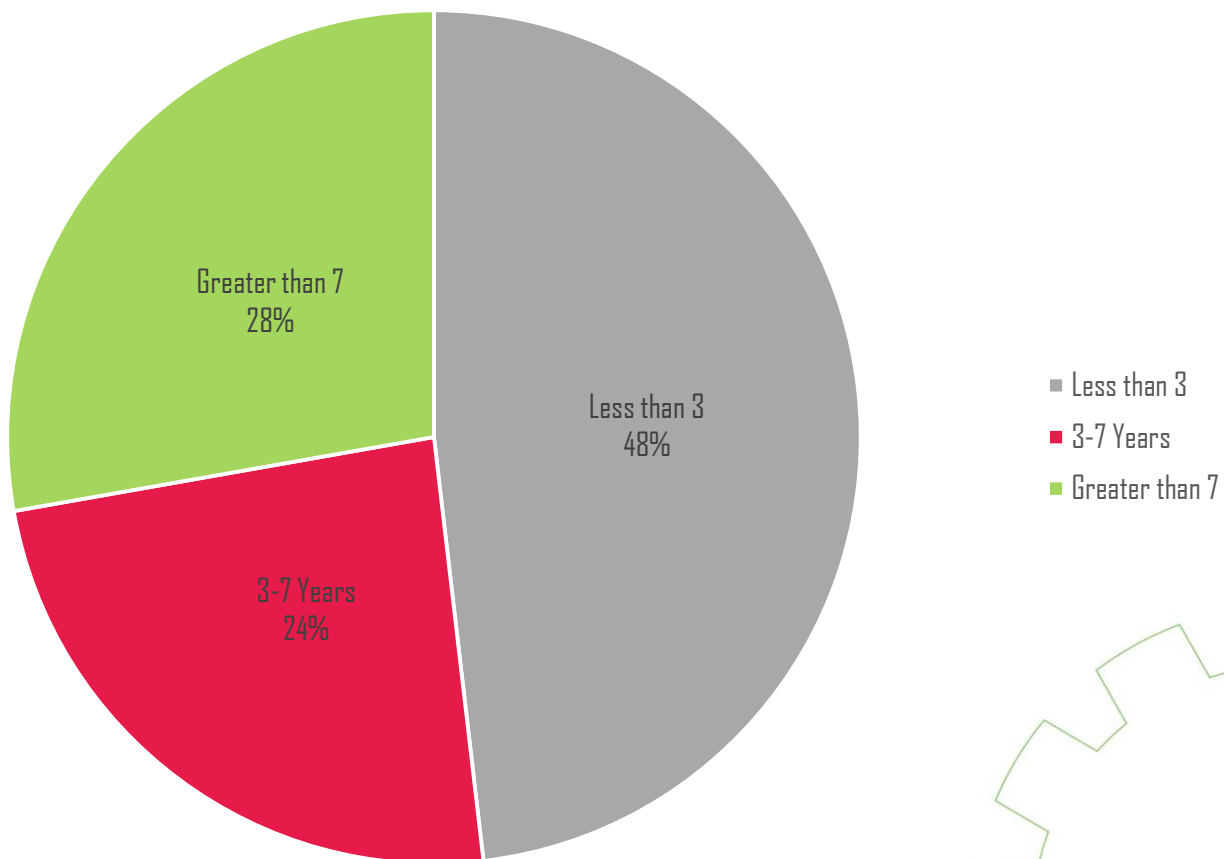

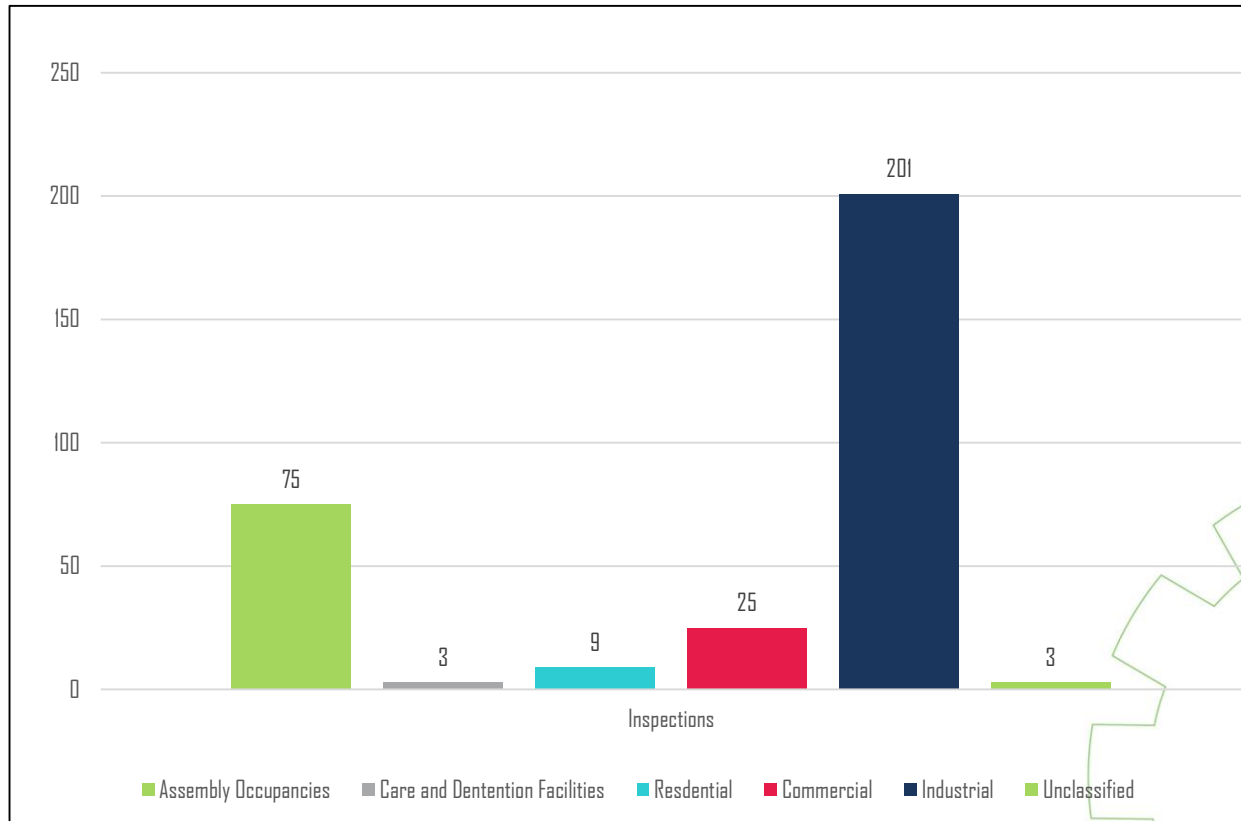

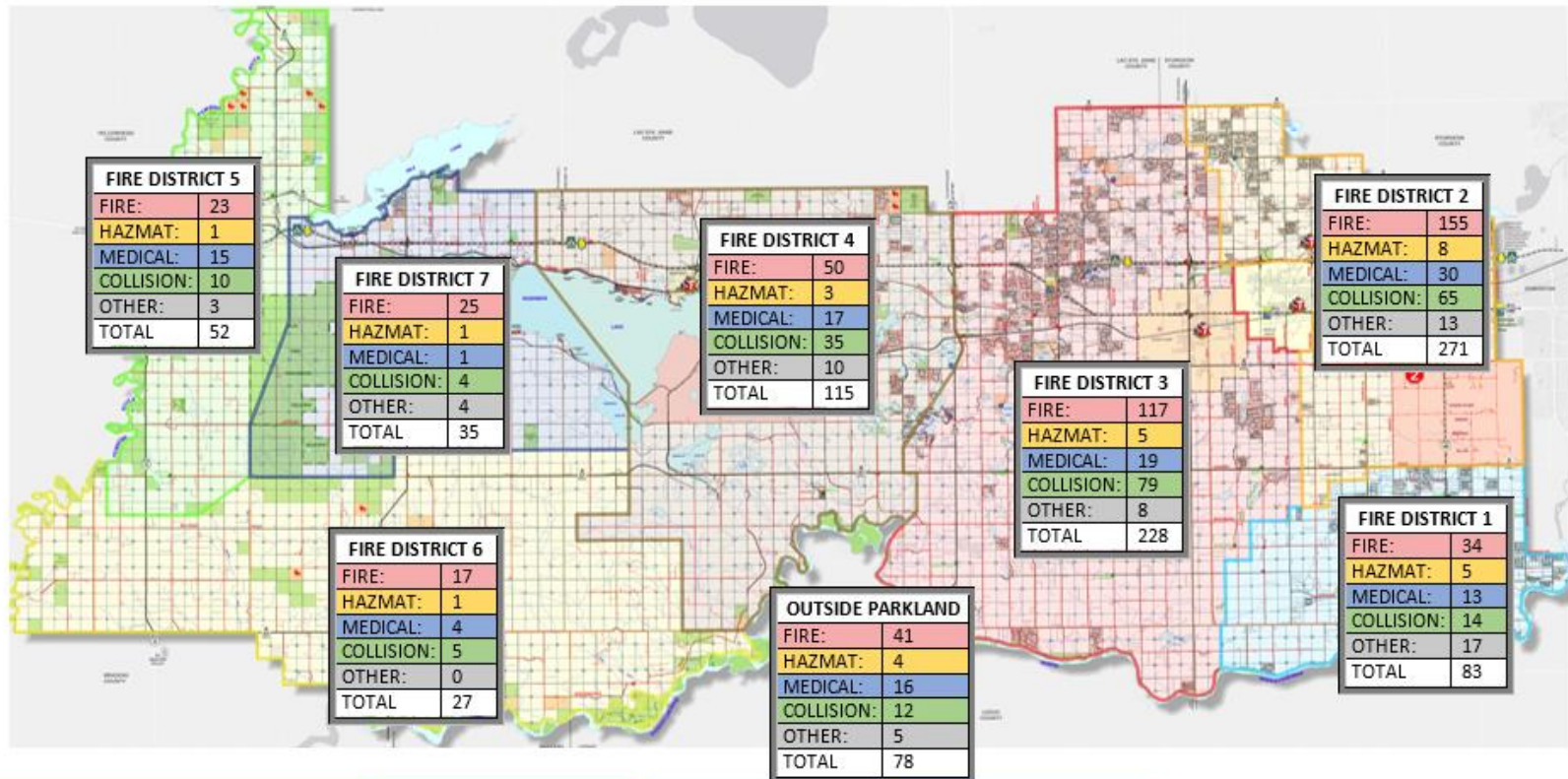
2016 Inspection Data

Generic Geographic Display of Incident Data

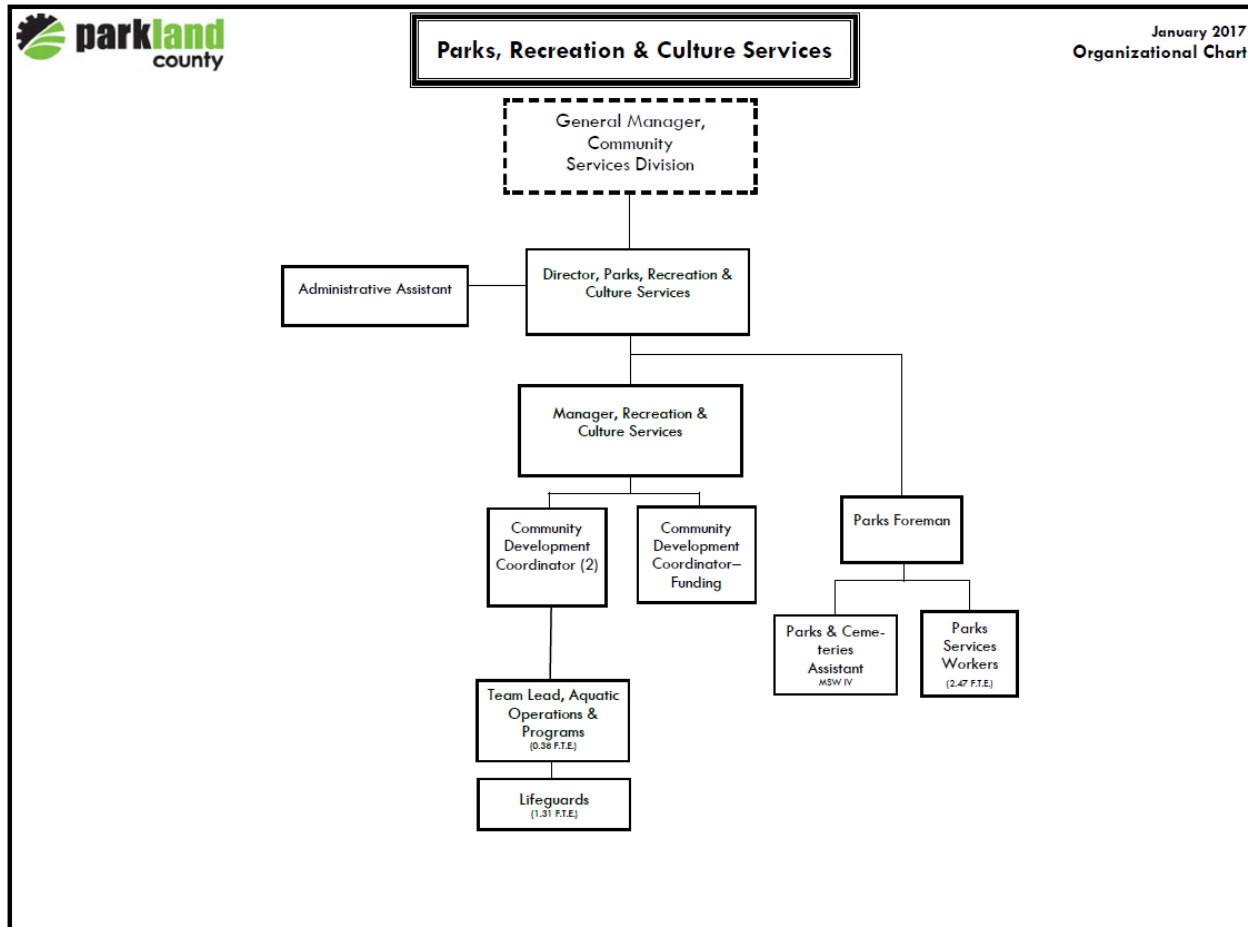

Parks, Recreation & Culture Update

Recreation Facilities

Meridian Sports Park

- Facility rentals increased over 2015
- Fields and Diamonds maintained an average of 3 times per week all season (60 total)
- Total number of hours booked: Soccer – 220 hours and Ball Diamonds – 450 hours
- Partnered with Smart Parkland to install Soofa solar powered charging bench and wifi hotspot

Entwistle Pool

- Functional Program Plan for Indoor Pool and Multi-purpose Hub completed as part of Parks, Recreation and Culture Master Plan
- Overall revenues and attendance down due primarily to abnormally poor weather

Recreation and Culture Cost Share Management

- Worked with cost share partners on operating cost share data and payments as per agreements
- Verified capital cost share requests that were approved by Council, paid accordingly

Parks and Open Spaces Management

- Maintained approximately 47 hectares of green space along with turf maintenance at all County owned buildings and major County entrance signs
- Maintained 20 km of developed trails through spring – fall on an average of every 10 – 14 days
- Groomed and track set 14 km of trails in the winter regularly
- Completed 85% of Devonian Gardens Trail Link, remainder to be completed over winter/spring 2017

Community Association/Playschool Supports

- Attended approximately 60 Community Association monthly meetings in-person
- Assisted 18 Community Associations with topic specific support in-person
- Approximately 3500 topic specific contacts via phone or email with all 27 Community Associations and 8 playschools
- Hosted Volunteer of the Year, and two President's Forum
- Hosted an Insurance Information Night with 23 Community Associations represented

Community Grant Funding Programs

Community Association Grants

- Hosted 3 Grant Info Nights with a total of 20 agencies represented
- Approved 26 Program/Event Grants for a total of \$26,000
- Approved \$103,000 in operating and recreation amenity grants, all 27 CA's received funding
- Approved \$53,000 in Minor Sustainability Grants via 17 grant applications to 12 Community Associations
- Approved 2 Major Sustainability Grants for inclusion in the 2017 budget
- Approved 1 Signage Grant

Non-Profit Organization Grants

- Approved 34 Non-Profit Grants for a total of \$73,000 for inclusion in 2017 budget
- Approved 4 specialized transportation grants for a total of \$28,500
- Canada 150 Grant
- Approved 21 applications for a total of \$30,000
- Will advertise a second round of applications for the remaining \$15,000 in approved funding

Family and Community Support Services and Community/Regional Programs

Children and Youth

- 6 workshops/events through First Five Forever with a total of 200+ participants
- Parkland Village Youth averaged 20 participants per evening, once a week during the school year
- Summer Camps (funded directly) held at 4 locations with a total of 86 participants (all but one camp was at capacity)
- 4 additional Summer Camps (facilitated by our partners) held at 3 locations with a total of 80 participants
- Kidsport saw an increase in applications in 2016 (estimated 90 of 320 applicants were from Parkland County, total of \$89,000 in support provided, which is \$25,000 higher than 2015)
- MiniMonster Bash had approximately 1000 people in attendance

Seniors

- Adventures in Aging Conference hosted with 180 participants
- Picnic in the Past hosted with 120 participants
- Attended 6 Seniors Interagency meetings
- Snow Removal Program, 59 eligible households with 25 households accessing funding in 2016

Family

- Aboriginal Day, approximately 300 in attendance for the breakfast portion
- Kids Can Catch – provided hot chocolate to 600 people, partnered with Planning and Economic Diversification
- Installed 4 Inclusive Swings at various playgrounds in the County

Community Development

- Spring and Fall Information Fair hosted with a total of 113 organizations taking part
- Volunteer Appreciation Dinner hosted with 600 participants
- Participated in Acreage Days
- Tri-Region Community Development Committee hosted 15 workshops on a variety of topics, with a total of 190 participants
