
CAMPAIGN UPDATE

INTRODUCTION

- The Keep Parkland Growing campaign was established with the intention of promoting community support for infrastructure projects that would allow the County to diversify the local economy.
- The Government of Alberta needed to hear from our residents. The campaign provided residents with a stake in the process, allowing them to provide input and engaging in a conversation where they might not have had the opportunity before.
- In total, the eight posts shared for the campaign reached over 75 thousand people, receiving 1890 reactions and 672 comments.
