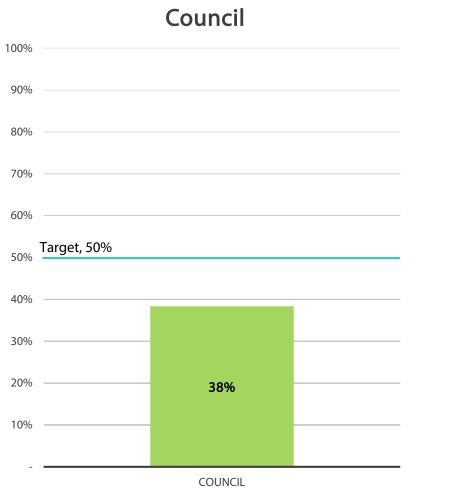

- Overall we are 45% Spent.





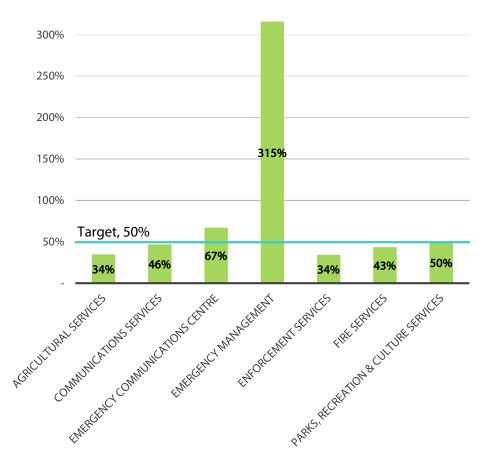

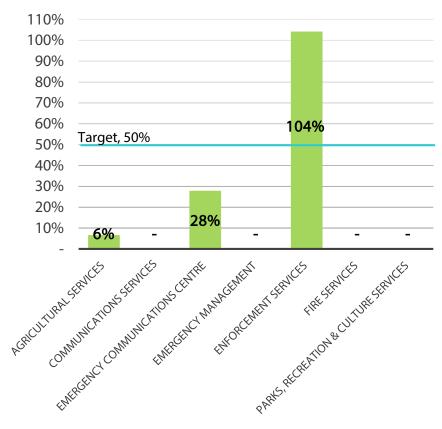

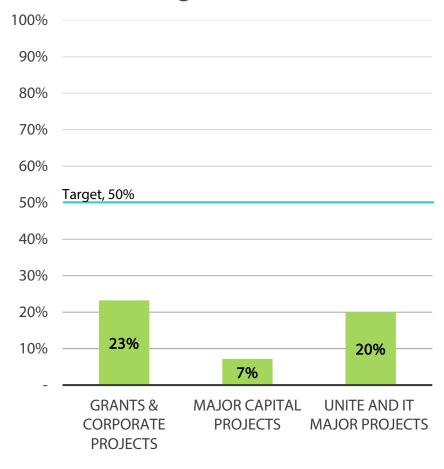

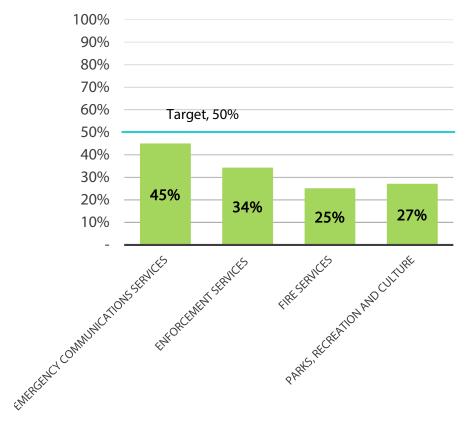

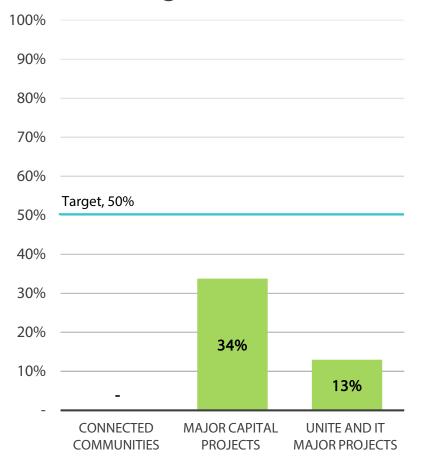

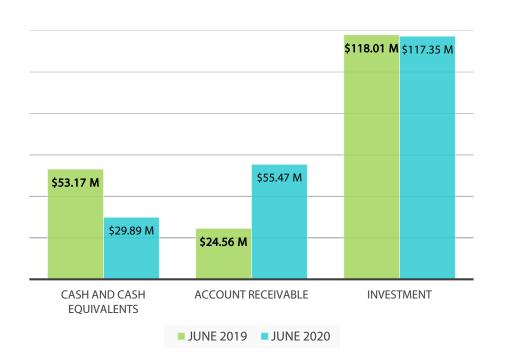

Cashflow Analysis



- Significant drop in cash and cash equivalent and sharp increase in receivable relative to prior year's levels
- 2020 total tax levy = \$89.51 million, almost at par with 2019 tax levy of \$89.63
- Percentage tax outstanding at June 2020 is 53% (20% June 2019)
- Large Corporations (Corporations with >\$1M in property taxes) outstanding balance is 29% of total outstanding Accounts Receivable





- A slight increase in Longterm debt resulting from;
 - New debt of \$1,146,804 for reservoir construction
 - Debt payment \$460,895
 during the 2nd quarter
- This excludes committed debt





Tangible Capital Assets

• TCA increased by 1% during the 2nd quarter reflecting the net of \$11.5 M capital expenditures and \$4.2 M amortization

Tangible Capital Assets are managed and held for use in the production or supply of municipal goods and services.



NET FINACIAL ASSET POSITION



Net Financial Asset is a key indicator of the County's sustainability, which is the ability to maintain services and meet financial commitments

- The 2nd quarter drop in net financial assets reflect the County's use of restricted surplus to purchase Tangible Capital Asset
- Net financial assets expected to fall further as the County spend on major capital projects such as PCTS, Entwistle Pool & Community Hub and Acheson Fire Hall Rehabilitation
- About \$5 million of restricted surplus spent on capital projects

Net Financial Assets is the difference between financial assets and liabilities

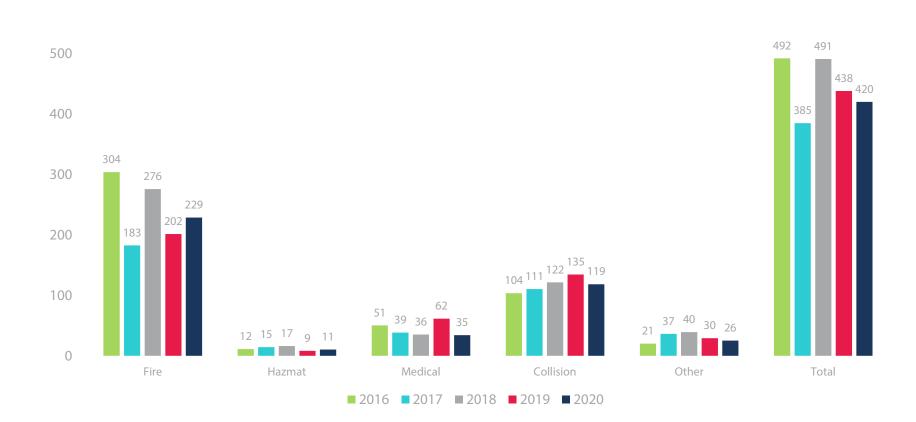

Year to Date Comparison of Total Incident Activity Incident that have occurred in Parkland County

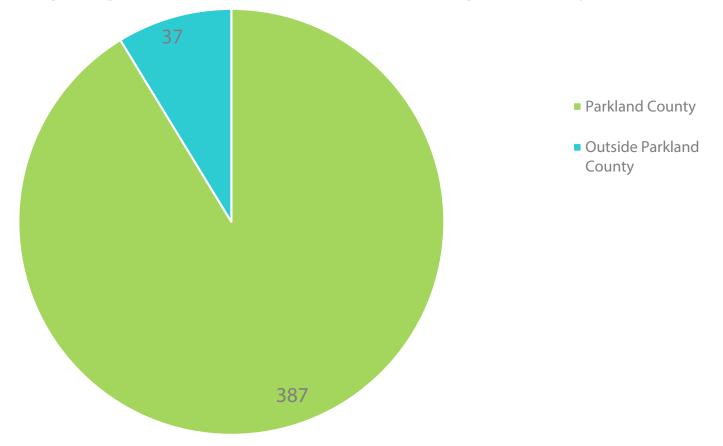




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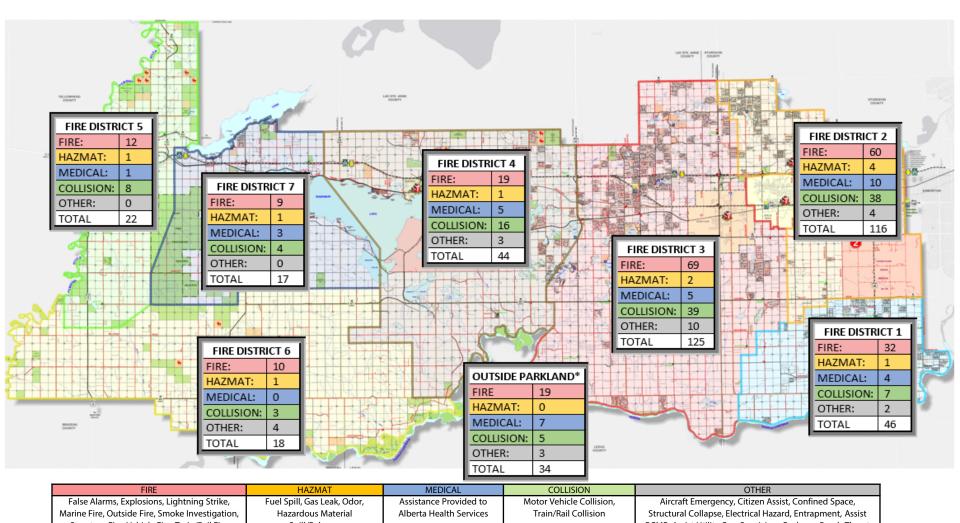
YTD INCIDENTS BY LOCATION

YTD INCIDENT LOCATIONS, BY TYPE



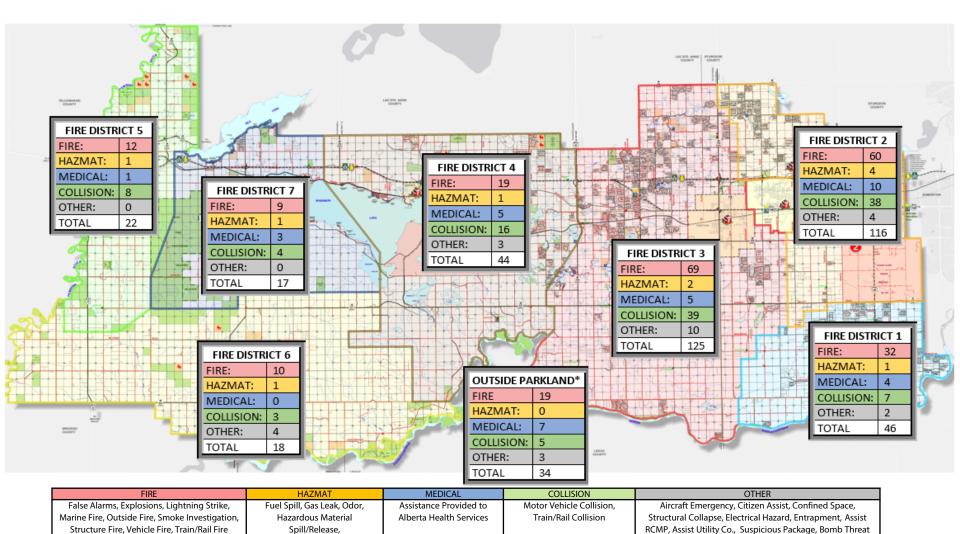

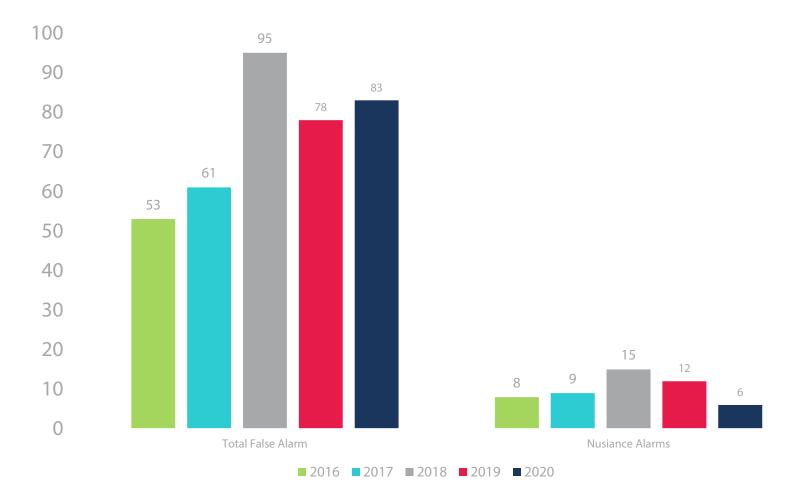
YTD STATION DISPATCHES, BY TYPE
